Making School a Priority

With the holidays right around the corner, it can be hard to keep children focused on learning. What can you do to make school a top priority for your kids? Keep these simple ideas in mind-they're useful at any time of the year.

Make attendance job #1.

Let your kids know that unless they're sick, they must go to school. Try to schedule routine dentist and doctor appointments after school hours. If possible, take family vacations during school breaks.

Tip: Give your child a perfect attendance award each month or a "Job Well Done" coupon good for a night of bowling or a movie.

Show you care.


Want your children to know that you're interested in their learning? Talk about their school activities and projects. Attend as many school events as you can. If homework and after school activities conflict, speak up: "I know you have a baseball practice this evening, but homework comes first. After you finish, I'll take you to practice."

Keep it upbeat.

Try to set a positive example for your children, even when your own day has been difficult. Instead of saying, "I had a hard day at work, I will never get my project done," try "Work was hard today, but I made some progress on my project." If you show a positive attitude about your work, your student may feel better about their own.

In Kindergarten we finished our Bullying Behaviors Unit and continue our Good Manners Unit including "Filling Buckets". We discussed that everyone has an invisible bucket. We can choose to fill up someone's bucket with kindness, or dip out of someone's bucket with unkind words or actions. The Kindergarten students are doing a great job of "filling buckets" with kind words, compliments, and actions.

The Second through Sixth grade are wrapping up our Bullying Unit. We discussed bullying behaviors, and the definition of being bullied is 1. Hurtful, 2. On purpose, 3. More than one time. We also talked about at least four things we could do if we are being bullied 1. Tell an adult, 2. Stand up for your self, 3. Ignore the behavior, and 4. Walk away. Lastly we discussed what a Bystander is and the difference between Telling vs Tattling. Please discuss these topics with your son/daughter and encourage them to tell an adult at school if they see bullying behaviors. We will soon start our Be a Buddy Unit.

The Fourth grade students have been learning about Community: a group of people, working together, for a common goal. We started reading the book "The Way to Go" and have had great discussion. Each student received their own book donated by local businesses and will take it home when we are finished.

Health & Wellness



Its that time of the year again for cold and flu season. Please **do not** send students to school with temps of 100 degrees or more. **If students have had a fever, they need to be fever free for 24 hours before returning to school. If students have the stomach flu, they need to stay home for at least 24 hours since the last time they had an emesis.** If students have severe coughs, you can send cough syrups and cough drops to school and give them to the secretary so she can give it throughout the day. The best way to prevent the spreading of cough and colds is to cough in your elbow and to use good handwashing.

Also, it is getting colder outside and with that being said the students need to remember to bring heavier coats, mittens/gloves and hats to school. When the snow starts to fly and accumulate then the students need to bring boots/snow pants (if they choose to) to school. Also, students should not be sharing hats, hoodies, scarfs, combs, brushes, ponies and headbands.



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
