In September 2021, the Loup Trail Chapter of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (NSDAR) invited area students in grades 5 thru 8, to enter an American History essay contest. Students were asked to submit a 300 – 1,000 word essay (depending on the grade level) that addressed the topic: "The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier".

November 11, 2021 marked the 100th anniversary of the dedication of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Students were asked to imagine that they had a brother who lost his life on the battlefields of France during World War I, and that their family had attended the November 11, 1921 dedication of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Washington, D.C. Students were to describe what this would have meant to themselves and their family. They were to also include an explanation of why it is important to remember those who have given their lives to serve our nation.

Eleven students from the Burwell 6th grade class participated in this national contest. Jesa Anderson's 981-word essay was the 2022 6th Grade Nebraska State Winner. She received a medal and a monetary award for her written work.

This months Teacher Spotlight will come from Mrs. Williams from Second Grade.

1. What is your #1 rule in your classroom?

5. What inspires you to teach?

Mrs. Williams—I love kids, and I love learning new things, so for me to get to see young people experiencing those moments when they really understand something...that's what inspires me!

6. If you had to describe your classroom and students to a blind person, how would you describe it?

Mrs. Williams— Well, we're often a little crazy but smiling; a little loud but learning; and our room is full of bright colors and kids willing to help their friends when needed.

7. If you could switch roles with another teacher or staff member for one day, who would it be and why?

Mrs. Williams— I would switch roles with Miss A, but just for a day, to see what the kids in 3rd grade remembered from 2nd grade! However, personal opinion, 2nd grade is the best and I wouldn't really want to switch anyone for very long!



Recently, in Mrs.Schott's 6th grade classroom, we had a guest speaker. Stefania Passyka, also known as Sonn, was invited to speak to our class because her origins began in Ukraine. Sonn lives close to the school and loves her life in America. She began her story telling us about her life that began in a displacement camp in Germany.

In 1940, Sonn's mother was taken by the German Nazi's and her parents were shot. At just 17 years of age she was then put in a German labor camp. A German farmer took her to work for him for the next four years. After the war ended, Sonn's mother did not want to go back to Ukraine and she met Niloki Kasyan in an army barracks. After a short courtship, Stefania Passyka was born on July 24, 1946, in a displacement camp in Heiden, Germany. Tragically her biological father was killed in a vehicle accident when Sonn was just one year old.

Her mother went on to marry Wassyl Passyka, who brought with him his siblings, John and Olga. Together they had a little girl named Etica and later Jim and Mary. They wanted to move to London, Ontario where there was a Ukrainian community already established. However, by some turn of events they ended up in America.

It was the year 1954 and Sonn and her family were taking the last boat from Germany to Ellis Island. When they arrived, she and the rest of her family were put through tough and extreme health tests. They had to wait a few days until a social worker from the Lutheran Social Services arrived and handed them papers which arranged for their family to go to Bassett, Nebraska. The family lived and worked for a rancher in Bassett for two years until the family's next move.

Sonn was a teenager when her father purchased 50 acres of land that was just a couple miles outside of Ainsworth, Nebraska. Sonn graduated from Ainsworth High School in 1968 and went on to Wayne State College to become a teacher. She was also known for her love of sports and even played in college. Sonn loved basketball and volleyball. With her love for athletics, Sonn was hired as a P.E. teacher in Clinton, Iowa. She shared with us that her office was actually in her car! Her second job was in Mukwonago, Wisconsin. Mukwonago is the native Indian word for "place of the bear." The area was originally a Native American village and the tribal seat of the Bear Clan of the <u>Potawatomi</u> Indians. It was a smaller community where Sonn taught for 32 years until her retirement.

Since Stefania Passyka visited our classroom we have learned a lot about the country of Ukraine. The Ukrainian flag is blue and yellow. The blue on the top represents the beautiful skies of Ukraine and the yellow is symbolic of the plentiful wheat fields. The soil in Ukraine is very rich and wheat fields flourish. Ukraine is known as the 'breadbasket of Europe' and is among the top three exporters of grain in the world. The Ukrainian flower is the sunflower. Sunflowers are spectacular, highly productive and a major agricultural export of Ukraine. They are also the national flower of Ukraine and are a powerful symbol of the resistance of the Ukrainian people to the invasion by Russia.

Since the invasion of Russia on the Ukraine many people are without a home or have even lost their lives. Sonn left us with many things to think about and said that because of her experiences in life it has left her with a great appreciation for freedom and the life we are privileged to live in the United States of America. Sonn's message to us was to pray for the Ukrainian people.



National FFA Week was held on February 19th through the 26th. The elementary students participated in a school wide coloring contest, where one winner was chosen from each class. The petting zoo was held once again on March 4th. Animals included in the petting zoo were pigs, chickens, a donkey, lambs, a calf, and a pony. Thank you Mr. Simpson and FFA Members for including the elementary during the week long celebration and to the families that brought their animals in for the petting zoo!
