This months Teacher Spotlight will come from Mrs. Schott in the 6th Grade classroom. **1. What is your #1 rule in your classroom?**

Mrs. Schott— My <u>most important</u> rule in the classroom is that we treat each other with respect. Students know the expectations and then come prepared to enjoy learning and are able to be themselves without fear of criticism. I believe in building the self-esteem of ALL my students.

2. What is your favorite part of the school day?

Mrs. Schott— It is the best part of any day when students are engaged in their learning and they have a "Light Bulb Moment" when the pieces of understanding come together. When students make connections that apply to their own lives and want to actively share with the group is another highlight of a school day.

3. What is your favorite class to teach?

Mrs. Schott— I honestly like aspects of all the subjects, but if I had to pick one, it would be science or even writing. Science is difficult to plan for and even harder to facilitate lab activities, but again, seeing students get excited and engaged is what makes it fun. Writing is great to have a window into a child's imagination.

4. If you could have an animal in your classroom, what would it be?

Mrs. Schott— I have had "critters" in my classroom over the years AND the novelty of it wears off pretty fast when the clean-up is required. One year we had Madagascar hissing cockroaches. They were low maintenance until they got out of the container and were climbing on the walls when Dave Newlin, our janitor discovered them! He was frantic when he called my husband who was an exterminator to explain the infestation!

5. What inspires you to teach?

Mrs. Schott— Because I am somewhat of an idealist, the notion that I could have a positive impact on a child's future is what inspires me. I believe that it is a noble profession.

6. If you had to describe your classroom and students to a blind person, how would you describe it?

Mrs. Schott— As you enter the sixth grade classroom you will encounter a hint of freshness from the aroma of "PURPLE" Pine Sol, one of Mrs. Schott's favorites, or her perfume. The room is decorated in festive monthly decorations along with the many supplemental content posters that fill the walls. Painted in Longhorn Purple and counters filled with manipulatives of various science subjects, the room is warm, welcoming, and comfortable. Patriotic and character building quotes encourage students to consider their privilege and choices. Albert Einstein guards the door as a daily reminder when you enter or exit the room that we should always ask questions and use our imagination. Burwell Public School students are fortunate to have our great school building!

7. If you could switch roles with another teacher or staff member for one day, who would it be and why?

Mrs. Schott— One day would not be sufficient to really get a taste of another's part in our educational team. I would like to switch for at least a month! I did my student teaching in 4th grade and loved it. I would enjoy working with 2nd or 3rd graders, too. Art is a passion of mine and I actually was offered the art position at the high school years ago, but I didn't want to leave the elementary students. Kindergarten looks fun, but I would need a guarantee that we could switch back!!!!



A Trip to Newfoundland

The students in the sixth grade began the school year reading, The Day the World Came to Town. The book is a true story of thirty-eight jetliners bound for the United States on September 11, 2001, the day that changed the world. Due to the closing of the U.S. airspace after the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center in New York City and the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., the citizens of Gander, Newfoundland, were called upon to come to the aid of more than six thousand displaced travelers. For the better part of a week nearly every man, woman, and child in Gander and the surrounding smaller towns stopped what they were doing so they could help. They put their own lives on hold for strangers from all over the world and asked for nothing in return. In a time when the goodness of mankind was in question the people of Newfoundland affirmed that love and kindness was still alive. This positive side of that tragic day has been reported by JimDeFede in this book, The Day the World Came to *Town: 9/11 in Gander, Newfoundland, as well in the Broadway play, Come From Away.* In a culminating lesson after completing the book, the students in Mrs. Schott's class were fortunate to have the opportunity to meet and ask questions through Zoom of Vernoy Paolini, someone that actually visited Gander, Newfoundland and organized the "Tour of Gratitude" in 2016.

Inspired by the stories of how the people of Gander housed, fed, and cared for these unexpected guests, Mrs.Paolini wished to personally thank the people of Gander. She and eleven others from New York traveled to Gander to express their gratitude and meet the very people discussed in the book. Vernoy is a wonderful source of information that the students enjoyed talking to and asking her their questions. It was a memorable experience for all of us!

In Kindergarten we finished our Bullying Behaviors Unit and continued our Good Manners Unit including "Filling Buckets". We discussed that everyone has an invisible bucket. We can choose to fill up someone's bucket with kindness, or dip out of someone's bucket with unkind words or actions. The Kindergarten students are doing a great job of "filling buckets" with kind words, compliments, and actions. The Second through fourth grade are wrapping up our Bullying Unit. We discussed bullying behaviors, and the definition of being bullied is 1. Hurtful, 2. On purpose, 3. More than one time. We also talked about at least four things we could do if we are being bullied 1. Tell an adult, 2. Stand up for your self, 3. Ignore the behavior, and 4. Walk away. Lastly we discussed what a Bystander is and the difference between Telling vs Tattling. Please discuss these topics with your son/daughter and encourage them to tell an adult at school if they see bullying behaviors. We will soon start our Be a Buddy Unit.

Germs are everywhere! They can get onto your hands and items you touch throughout the day. Washing hands at key times with soap and water is one of the most important steps you can take to get rid of germs and avoid spreading germs to those around you.

How can washing your hands keep you healthy?

Germs can get into the body through our eyes, nose, and mouth and make us sick. Handwashing with soap removes germs from hands and helps prevent sickness. Studies have shown that handwashing can prevent 1 in 3 diarrhea-related sicknesses and 1 in 5 respiratory infections, such as a cold or the flu.



Handwashing helps prevent infections for these reasons:



People often touch their eyes, nose, and mouth without realizing it, introducing germs into their bodies.



Germs from unwashed hands may get into foods and drinks when people prepare or consume them. Germs can grow in some types of foods or drinks and make people sick.



Germs from unwashed hands can be transferred to other objects, such as door knobs, tables, or toys, and then transferred to another person's hands.

What is the right way to wash your hands?

- Wet your hands with clean running water (warm or cold) and apply soap.
- 2. Lather your hands by rubbing them together with the soap.
- Scrub all surfaces of your hands, including the palms, backs, fingers, between your fingers, and under your nails. Keep scrubbing for at least 20 seconds. Need a timer? Hum the "Happy Birthday" song twice.
- 4. Rinse your hands under clean, running water.
- 5. Dry your hands using a clean towel or air dry them.
